

# Rhino poaching on the wane

Rhino poaching in Africa has declined from 2015 through to late 2022, according to a soon-to-be-released report. And this includes South Africa, which has borne the brunt of poaching over the past 17 years.

The total number of rhinos poached in South Africa fell from 1175 reported deaths in 2015 to 438 in 2022, says the report by the African Rhino Specialist Group of the International Union Conservation of Nature. In most other African states poaching fell last year. The exception was Namibia, where the number of rhinos poached increased from 47 in 2021 to 93 in 2022.

The AfSRG report found that within South Africa poaching has increasingly shifted away from the Kruger National Park (124 poached rhinos detected during 2022) to Kwazulu-Natal (228 poached rhino on state reserves; 16 poached rhinos on private properties). A further 70 poached rhinos were reported elsewhere in South Africa.

## African rhino populations looking up

The AfSRG has also reported an increase in African rhinos from 22,137 at the end of 2021 to **23,171** at the end of 2022. This comprised 6,468 black (increasing at 3.9% from 2021 to 2022) and 16,801 white rhinos (increasing at 5.6%). It is the first time since 2012 that white rhinos increased at a continental scale.

In an earlier report presented at CoP17 last year, the AfSRG noted that 96% of Africa's rhino populations were found in four range states in Africa. At the end of 2021, South Africa was home to 15,024 rhinos (68% of the continent's population), followed by Namibia with 3,390 rhinos (15%), Kenya 1,811 (8%), and Zimbabwe 1033 rhinos (5%).

Botswana, Tanzania, Eswatini (formerly Swaziland), Zambia, Rwanda and Malawi were collectively home to 803 rhinos (3,6 % of the continent's rhinos) at the end of 2021. The number of wild rhinos in Uganda, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Mozambique, Angola and Chad totalled 76, less than 0.4 % of the continent's population. While these rhino populations are tiny, there has been a significant increase in rhinos in each of these countries since 2005, with Botswana's populations increasing by 98%, from 5 to 265 since 2005.

## Black rhinos fare better than their white cousins

The AFSRG figures show the black rhino populations have almost doubled from 2005 to 2021 (3,726 in 2005 to 6,195 in 2021) compared to a 9% increase in white rhinos from 14,448 to 15,942 for the same period.

In South Africa, total African rhinoceros populations remained relatively stable, but there was a decrease in white rhinos, down by 544 from 13,512 in 2005 to 12,968 in 2021, compared to black rhino populations, which increased by 677 from 1,379 to 2,056 over the same period.

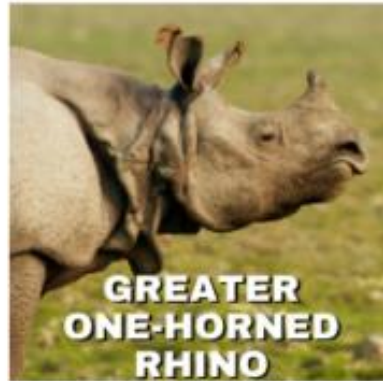
